# Principal's Letter

Dear parents/guardians, teachers, and students,

I hope you have had an enjoyable Spring Break. TJ has been very busy in the second phase of the renovation as the new cafeteria will open very soon. The significant construction has been occurring in the center of the building, only visible through a few rooms, such as in physics, 8th period, and biology. We're still 9-12 months away from completion of that space, and when phase 2 is over, the connectedness and fluidity walking through the building will be much more noticeable.

In March the SGA led the charge for a successful service week. Our leaders encouraged students to participate in a variety of donation drives for old electronics, test prep books, canned food, books, and school supplies. In addition, a wide variety of 8th period clubs held service activities, such as designing origami stars for Send-a-Smile, an

# President's Letter

**"Fit Not Brand"** -- So says Frank Bruni about choosing undergraduate college in his new book, "Where You Go Is Not Who You'll Be." I've not yet read this book, but my takeaway from recent excerpts, editorials, and interviews is: the most important factor in how college-bound high school students become interesting, self-sufficient adults is how their undergraduate college environment supports discovering/pursuing passions, learning new things, and dealing with disappointments.

Furthermore, these factors really don't correlate with how a college is ranked or its perceived prestige. Bruni's poll of successful people shows that few of them attended prestigious undergraduate colleges, which seems to confirm that a degree from such a college is not a prerequisite to success (or happiness).

Advice about choosing colleges is certainly timely for every Senior at TJ. I'm a Senior parent and thus our family is in the middle of waiting and evaluating. In general, we have tried not to fixate on grades, but rather tried to support our child's passions and independence to make decisions, hopefully without cutting too much into time for studying and sleeping. I'll admit that I have read college rankings and am aware of reputations and that our child has applied to a range of colleges.

I know that TJ counselors and the College Career Center support Mr. Bruni's advice – a March 19 email from the Department of Student Services urged all Seniors and their parents to read Mr. Bruni's essay (linked below in the Health & Wellness section). They stated that "this article really hit home for the Student Services Department." And Dr. Glazer often talks about students pursuing passions, not grades. Despite the realities of the

organization providing support to families with children who have cancer. Later this month, TWIST (Tomorrow's Women In Science and Technology), WISE (Women in Science and Engineering), and the **Biology Society will present Science and** Techstravaganza on April 11 from 10:00am to 4:00pm at Holmes Middle School. The event attracts thousands of elementary and middle school students to showcase a wide variety of hands-on investigations distributed throughout our gymnasiums and classrooms. It's a great way to illustrate how TJHSST serves as a regional school to inspire young minds from all of our participating school divisions. Throughout the spring, students also have a chance to give back to many neighborhood schools as STEMbassadors through service opportunities posted to the TJ Intranet.

For the last few months I have been profiling our progress on school goals. This month I'd like to reflect on consistency in grading practices, which has recently become a topic on the school district administration's agenda. In general, teachers who offer the same course have fairly similar grading practices because they develop their syllabi together. The intent of these common grading practices is to promote equity across sections of a class. In essence, if a student earns a B in one class, then they should earn a B in another section of the same course if they have developed the same knowledge, skills, and understanding. This year we have gone a step further to identify two practices that could be adopted across all of the courses in a subject matter (for example, science and technology, humanities, world languages, math and computer science, etc.). Those practices could be retake policies, common assessments, how to handle late work, how much to weigh tests as part of the grade, etc., as determined by the curricular division.

Currently, FCPS has begun exploring grading practices across the entire district with potential implementation as early as next year. Some people have asked me if this seems like a good measure for TJ. I have to admit it would have been helpful to develop school-wide practices before district-wide practices; however, it is comforting to know two teachers from each school will have a voice in the district's decision making process. TJ is a very different academic environment than other schools due to its rigorous standards to support critical inquiry research, problem solving, intellectual curiosity, and social responsibility. Grades in our courses should not be compared to other schools due to the nature of our student population as well as a uniquely different curriculum program of studies.

Above all, a modified grading system should not suppress the value of an education to an ongoing review and comparison of grades. Intellectual growth, development of habits of mind, and experiencing the joy of learning at the prospect of discovery are much more important than grades. Those are the attributes that enable our students' continued success beyond TJ. Some of you may contend that's not what matters for college admission, and if so, I encourage you to ask the admissions officers what they seek in their candidates. To generalize this issue one step further, TJ can also be seen as fit vs. brand. As PTSA President, I have had additional opportunities to field questions about TJ and see parents and students fixated on the perception of TJ as a prep school to guarantee admission to a prestigious college. Two anecdotes, among many I could offer:

- At this year's TJ open house, a young man and his father came up to the parents' table to ask questions. The father asked for advice on how to gain admittance to TJ. So I turned to the son and enthusiastically said, "So you're interested in science and math?" His response was, "not really."
- I recently ran into a friend in the area whose daughter is about to turn 2 years old. He said his network of parents with young children is starting to talk about and prepare for entering the school system. He said that everyone agrees that TJ is the best high school in the area. He wanted to know what he needed to do now to prepare his daughter to attend.

I do agree (and have said many times) that TJ is a wonderfully special place in many ways. I hope that the TJ community can continue to support a culture "to provide students with a challenging learning environment focused on math, science, and technology; to inspire joy at the prospect of discovery; and to foster a culture of innovation based on ethical behavior and the shared interests of humanity." Yet the anecdotes above indicate to me that this arms race risks a loss of perspective on what it takes to create a rewarding high school experience that can serve as a launching pad for college. At TJ, many students enthusiastically pursue their passions and many of them thrive without perfect GPAs. In Northern Virginia, rewarding experiences happen at high schools in the region for thousands of high school students. I hope that all high school and college students find their fit without worrying about brand.

# **PTSA Committee Updates**

#### Health and Wellness

#### New Messages from Our School Psychologist

Greg Myers, our school psychologist, addressed parents' questions regarding mental wellness at the March 8<sup>th</sup> Partnership Fund Lunar New Year Event. He also expanded his message from Mental Health Awareness Week, adding insightful thoughts and good advice for parents:

- Which risk factors for depression seem to be more prevalent at TJ?
  - Sleep deprivation
  - o Chronic stress
  - o Sedentary
  - Cognitive factors:
    - extrinsic orientation
    - performance-based self-worth
    - Iow self-compassion
  - o Weak social connectedness (for some)
  - Lack of opportunities for/exposure to generosity/kindness/altruism
- Are the depression rates higher at TJ?
  - No. By their own responses on youth survey data, TJ rates (20%) are below FCPS average (30%).
  - But a wise follow-up question is: is the etiology and course of depression different among gifted/high-achieving students?
    - Do they mask their depression better? (Shame for being incapacitated/helpless)
    - Do they "hold out" longer before reaching crisis or reaching out for help?
    - Are they more vulnerable to "existential depression?"
- What to do as parents?
  - BE COURAGEOUS ENOUGH TO SET LIMITS; be an authoritative parent
    - They need your help to learn how to do this
    - Know your student's limitations
    - Closely evaluate total workload; do not choose a courseload that's unrealistic for YOUR child. How many hours of work per week are expected for their preferred schedule? Do not allow them to choose a schedule that will encroach on healthy

behaviors (sleep, exercise).

- Set hard parameters for sleep; firm bedtime, ENFORCED. Your student may suffer initially in the short-term, but Parkinson's Law will take over.
  - Work expands to fill the time allotted
  - How do you think TJ's student-athletes do it? Their grades seem just as good yet they have less time. We don't really think that's because they are smarter than nonathletes do we?
- Set an even *firmer* rule that this bedtime cannot be exceeded two nights in a row
- IF your student, week after week, continues to exceed the bedtime, your student is overloaded. Period.
- Stop bright screen use (phone, laptop) an hour before bedtime. Make the bedroom a quiet zone. Place the devices outside of the bedroom each night. Model this behavior.
- BE A CURIOUS LISTENER, not a goal-oriented listener
  - On a regular basis, listen to your student without any goal in mind. No advice, no judgment, just be a good listener! That means be curious, ask questions to help you understand. Empathize, meaning feel their feelings.
- TEACH AND MODEL GOOD SELF-CARE; build the habits now, before college
  - Eat well; reduce sugar and caffeine which can destabilize one's mood
  - Be active, everyday
  - Get adequate and routinized sleep
  - Be compassionate toward self and accepting of weaknesses
    - We all have weaknesses, but many gifted students are delayed in this development of self-acceptance
  - Help them see the connection, in situ.
    You're stressed, fatigued, overwhelmed and we know the good actions to take but we don't always take them—so help them do it! Go to bed early. Go for a walk. Lift some weights. Do something altruistic.
- Teach and model a lifestyle that has room for great achievements AND self-care
  - We can do this! It HAS to be possible.

Mulligan "Instead of being nurtured towards real curiosity and a genuine sense of citizenship, these millennials are conditioned to think that everything they do is for the purpose of looking good in the eyes of admissions officers and employers: you earn good grades not because they mean you are learning something, but rather because they will help you stand out from your peers when applying to the Ivies. You engage in community service not because you wish genuinely to make a positive difference in the lives of others but rather because that is how you burnish your resume -service as check-off box. You play sports not because they build character and teamwork and are a whole lot of fun, but because you want to try to get recruited for a college team. You study art or music not because you wish to refine your understanding of human nature, creativity and culture but because it will help you look smarter."

"Stop asking, 'What (What grade did you get? What team did you make?)' and begin asking, 'Who, Where, and How?'

- 1. Who tells us who we are?
- 2. Where do we want to go with our lives?
- 3. How do we want to get there?"

The note below from the faculty sponsors of the Class of 2018 explains what you need to know. Please mark your calendars so that students can plan to attend and parents can volunteer to make this a fun night for the Class of 2018!

Here is the note from the Faculty Sponsors:

Hello Class of 2018 Parents!

We are Mike Auerbach (Math/CS) and Chuck Dela Cuesta (SciTech), faculty sponsors of the Class of 2018. We have been working closely with our Freshman class officers to plan the biggest event of Freshman year, the Freshman Lock-Up. Lock-Up is usually named "Lock-In" and it is traditionally an allnight event held at TJ. Since we cannot use TJ due to the construction, we have a new location and a new name: our Freshman Lock-Up will be on Friday, May 15, at Audrey Moore Recreational Center, 8100 Braddock Road, Annandale, Virginia 22003. The event begins at 7:00pm on Friday, May 15, and ends at 6:00am on Saturday, May 16. We rent out the entire Rec Center and have activities going all night. Almost every Freshman has attended this event in the past! We apologize in advance if this date conflicts with other activities your student may participate in, but our options for obtaining the Rec Center were limited.

On March 23, we held a Freshman class meeting and announced the details of the Lock-Up to all students. We also sent them home with a packet of information, which you hopefully received! If not, you can contact us, and we can e-mail you the information, or the students can access it via the class Facebook page.

From the parents, we would like the following:

- Each parent must fill out the permission form and the transportation form. Since the event begins 3 hours after the school day ends, we suspect some kids will go home on the bus Friday afternoon and then be driven to Audrey Moore, which is fine. We also expect many students will remain at TJ for the afternoon, and will need a ride to Audrey Moore from TJ. If you indicate your plans on the form included in the packet, we will make sure we have enough volunteers to provide shuttle service from TJ to Audrey Moore that all students who need a ride can get one.

- The cost of Lock-Up will be \$50. Checks can be made payable to "TJHSST Class of 2018." The net proceeds from Lock-Up will eventually fund a major portion of prom and graduation, both of which must be paid for by class funds. 
#### **FUTURE PROBLEM SOLVERS**

TJFPS secured six of 14 available senior division bids and seven of 24 middle division bids, and is looking forward to a strong showing at the State Bowl, where they will compete with other qualifying teams from around the state. Scenario Writing winners and Community Problem Solving members will also accompany the 13 qualifying teams to the state competition.

Until the State Bowl, TJFPS will focus mainly on research for the State Bowl topic, "Enhancing Human Potential". The club is also preparing to conduct its annual revision of its Constitution, which specifies how the club functions, including officer duties and how the election process is conducted.

In the 2015 Virginia State Scenario Writing

Competition, Thomas Jefferson Future Problem Solving (TJFPS) achieved a clean sweep in the Senior Division, with TJFPS members Melanie Piller, Sharon Liu, and Ramya Ravi earning first, second, and third place, respectively. In the Scenario Writing Competition, competitors are required to create 1500-word short stories, having selected one of the futuristic topics for the 2014-2015 competitive season: "Space," "Propaganda," "Processed Food," "Impact of Social Media," and "Enhancing Human Potential." Writers research the future of such issues to present a story that reflects anticipated societal and technological change. #### **UAV CLUB**



#### SWIM AND DIVE





It is held annually along the Schuylkill River near Boathouse Row in Philadelphia. Competing crews come from schools all over North America, though most hail from the Northeast and Mid-Atlantic. The coaches plan to take the first, second, and third eights (boats) on both the boys' and girls' teams, as well as the boys' and girls' Freshman eight. Coaches will also take a few alternates in case of illness, injury, etc. For Freshman and novice parents, your child's coach will be able to predict whether your child's boat will be competing in this race around the time of spring break, two-a-day practices. The travel arrangements for the students are made by the travel coordinator, **Lisa Layfield**. Parents, if you can safely guess that you will need a room in Philadelphia, please check our <u>website</u> and start making travel arrangements.

The second two-day regatta is the Scholastic Rowing Association of America (SRAA) National Regatta on May 23 & 24 in Camden, NJ. The competitors for this race are determined by the results of the state finals on May 2 for the lower boats (Ted Phoenix Regatta) and May 9 for the upper boats (VASRA Championships). The arrangements for the qualifying rowers, coxswains, and alternates will be made by the travel coordinator.
